About this Live Webinar

This advanced NICU therapy course will enable clinicians to collaboratively and dynamically apply strategies that support medically-fragile infants during their NICU stay and upon discharge. Problem-solving techniques specific to this setting will examine modifications to developmental and family-integrated practices to meet infants' unique needs. Clinicians will explore neuroprotective and neuropromotive strategies for multiple NICU scenarios. Within this critical-thinking framework, clinicians will incorporate parent and caregiver advocacy and integration strategies for long-term support of infants' needs.
