About this Live Webinar

This advanced NICU therapy course will enable clinicians to collaboratively and dynamically apply strategies that support medically-fragile infants during their NICU stay and upon discharge. Problem-solving techniques specific to this setting will examine modifications to developmental and family-integrated practices to meet infants' unique needs. Clinicians will explore neuroprotective and neuropromotive strategies for multiple NICU scenarios. Within this critical-thinking framework, clinicians will incorporate parent and caregiver advocacy and integration strategies for long-term support of infants' needs. Additionally, participants will explore a broader role for therapy in the NICU from admission through discharge, using a strong developmental perspective and highlighting long-term outcomes and team collaboration. This will culminate in a practical application exercise around continuous quality improvement that will translate to better defined, measured and realized therapeutic outcomes for neonates.

- Utilize three strategies to support infants with extreme prematurity, complex neurological diagnoses, and in utero substance exposure using advanced problem-solving techniques.
- Apply at least two neuroprotective and neuropromotive strategies to support complex patients in the NICU.

- Recommend a way to increase therapists' presence or therapeutic practices in the NICU, using the cases provided.
